

# Coordinate Systems Projected onto a Screen





# Camera Calibration

- Extrinsic parameters (“pose estimation”)
- Intrinsic parameters (“calibration”)
- Tsai’s Approach:
  - Model of image formation steps
  - Two-stage algorithm to determine model parameters


# Tsai's Approach Overview

- World-to-camera transformation: rotation followed by translation
- 6 intrinsic and 6 extrinsic camera parameters
- Parallelism constraint under radial distortion, variable focal length and translation in z
- 2-stage algorithm:
  - Compute 3D orientation,  $T_x$  and  $T_y$
  - Compute focal length, distortion coefficients and  $T_z$
  - (other parameters taken from device specifications)
- Separate solutions for coplanar and non-coplanar sets of markers

# Image Formation Steps

- Given: Points in world coords ( $x_w, y_w, z_w$ )
- World-to-camera transformation. Params:  $R, T$ 
  - ( $x, y, z$ )  $\downarrow$  camera coords
- Idealized 3D-to-2D projection. Param:  $f$ 
  - ( $X_u, Y_u$ )  $\downarrow$  ideal image coords
- Radial lens distortion. Params:  $k_1, k_2$ 
  - ( $X_d, Y_d$ )  $\downarrow$  true image coords
- TV scanning, sampling. Params:  $s_x, C_x, C_y$
- Result: Points in computer image coords ( $X_f, Y_f$ )

# Step 1: World-to-Camera Transformation



# Step 1: World-to-Camera Transformation

$$\begin{bmatrix} x \\ y \\ z \end{bmatrix} = R \begin{bmatrix} x_w \\ y_w \\ z_w \end{bmatrix} + T$$


$$\begin{bmatrix} x \\ y \\ z \end{bmatrix} = \begin{pmatrix} r_1 & r_2 & r_3 \\ r_4 & r_5 & r_6 \\ r_7 & r_8 & r_9 \end{pmatrix} \begin{bmatrix} x_w \\ y_w \\ z_w \end{bmatrix} + \begin{bmatrix} T_x \\ T_y \\ T_z \end{bmatrix}$$

$$x = r_1 x_w + r_2 y_w + r_3 z_w + T_x$$

$$y = r_4 x_w + r_5 y_w + r_6 z_w + T_y$$

$$z = r_7 x_w + r_8 y_w + r_9 z_w + T_z$$

# Step 2: Idealized 3D-to-2D Projection

$$X_u = f \frac{x}{z}$$

$$= f \frac{r_1 x_w + r_2 y_w + r_3 z_w + T_x}{r_7 x_w + r_8 y_w + r_9 z_w + T_z}$$

$$Y_u = f \frac{y}{z}$$

$$= f \frac{r_4 x_w + r_5 y_w + r_6 z_w + T_y}{r_7 x_w + r_8 y_w + r_9 z_w + T_z}$$

# Step 3: Radial Lens Distortion




Figure 1. Camera Geometry with Perspective Projection and Radial Lens Distortion

# Step 3: Radial Lens Distortion

$$X_d = X_u - D_x$$


$$Y_d = Y_u - D_y$$

with:

$$D_x = X_d (\square_1 r^2 + \square_2 r^4)$$

$$D_y = Y_d (\square_1 r^2 + \square_2 r^4)$$

$$r = \sqrt{X_d^2 + Y_d^2}$$



# Step 4: TV Scanning, Sampling

$$X_f = (s_x / d_x') X_d + C_x$$

$$Y_f = (1 / d_y) Y_d + C_y$$

with:

$(X_f, Y_f)$ : row, column of image pixel in frame memory

$s_x$ : uncertainty image scale factor

$(C_x, C_y)$ : center of computer image

$d_x$ : distance between adjacent sensor elements (x-dir)

$d_y$ : distance between adjacent sensor elements (y-dir)

$d_x' = d_x (N_{cx} / N_{fx})$

$N_{cx}$ : number of sensor elements (x-dir)

$N_{fx}$ : number of pixels in a line

# Image Formation Steps

## Summary

$$X_u = f \frac{x/z}{x^2 + z^2} =$$

$$X_u = X_d + D_x = X_d + X_d (\Box_1 r^2 + \Box_2 r^4)$$

$$\begin{aligned} & f \frac{r_1 X_w + r_2 y_w + r_3 z_w + T_x}{r_7 X_w + r_8 y_w + r_9 z_w + T_z} \\ &= (d_x' / s_x) (X_f - C_x) [1 + (\Box_1 r^2 + \Box_2 r^4)] \end{aligned}$$

$$Y_u = f \frac{y/z}{x^2 + z^2} =$$

$$Y_u = y_d + D_y = Y_d + Y_d (\Box_1 r^2 + \Box_2 r^4)$$

$$\begin{aligned} & f \frac{r_4 X_w + r_5 y_w + r_6 z_w + T_y}{r_7 X_w + r_8 y_w + r_9 z_w + T_z} \\ &= d_y (Y_f - C_y) [1 + (\Box_1 r^2 + \Box_2 r^4)] \end{aligned}$$

# Two-Stage Camera Calibration Technique

- Preparation:
  - Determine  $N_{cx}$ ,  $N_{fx}$ ,  $d_x'$  and  $d_y'$  from device specifications, assume  $(C_x, C_y)$  is the center pixel of the image
  - Measure markers ( $i:1..N$ ) in the scene  $(x_w, y_w, z_w)_i$
  - For current image: determine computer image coordinates  $(X_f, Y_f)_j$  of all visible markers ( $j \sqsubset 1..N$ )
- Stage 1:  
Compute 3D orientation ( $R$ ) and position ( $T_x, T_y$ ) and scale factor ( $s_x$ )
- Stage 2:  
Compute effective focal length ( $f$ ) distortion coefficients ( $\alpha_1, \alpha_2$ ), and z position  $T_z$

# Stage 1: Compute 3D Orientation and Position

- Get distorted image coordinates ( $X_d$ ,  $Y_d$ )
- Compute transformation parameters (5-7 mixed terms of  $R$  and  $T$ )
- Determine  $R$  and  $T$  from mixed terms





Figure 1. Camera Geometry with Perspective Projection and Radial Lens Distortion

# Parallelism Constraint



Radial distortion does not alter the direction of the vector from the origin to the image point:

$$\overline{O_f P_u} \parallel \overline{O_f P_d} \parallel \overline{P_{oz} P}$$

# Parallelism Constraint

Radial distortion does not alter the direction of the vector from the origin to the image point:  $\overline{O_f P_d} \parallel \overline{P_{oz} P}$

$$\begin{bmatrix} 0 \\ 0 \\ f \end{bmatrix} \begin{bmatrix} X_d \\ Y_d \\ f \end{bmatrix} \parallel \begin{bmatrix} 0 \\ 0 \\ z \end{bmatrix} \begin{bmatrix} x \\ y \\ z \end{bmatrix}$$

$$\begin{bmatrix} X_d \\ Y_d \end{bmatrix} = \square \begin{bmatrix} x \\ y \end{bmatrix}$$

$$X_d y = Y_d x$$

# Parallelism Constraint

$$\begin{aligned}
 X_d y &= Y_d x \\
 X_d(r_4 x_w + r_5 y_w + r_6 z_w + T_y) &= Y_d(r_1 x_w + r_2 y_w + r_3 z_w + T_x) \\
 X_d T_y &= Y_d(r_1 x_w + r_2 y_w + r_3 z_w + T_x) \\
 &\quad - X_d(r_4 x_w + r_5 y_w + r_6 z_w) \\
 X_d = & Y_d x_w(r_1/T_y) + Y_d y_w(r_2/T_y) + Y_d z_w(r_3/T_y) + Y_d(T_x/T_y) \\
 &- X_d x_w(r_4/T_y) - X_d y_w(r_5/T_y) - X_d z_w(r_6/T_y)
 \end{aligned}$$

Written as vectors and matrix for all markers (i: 1..N):

$$X_{di} = [Y_d x_w \quad Y_d y_w \quad Y_d z_w \quad Y_d \quad -X_d x_w \quad -X_d y_w \quad -X_d z_w]_i \circ$$

$$[\frac{r_1}{T_y} \quad \frac{r_2}{T_y} \quad \frac{r_3}{T_y} \quad \frac{T_x}{T_y} \quad \frac{r_4}{T_y} \quad \frac{r_5}{T_y} \quad \frac{r_6}{T_y}]$$

Data from each marker becomes a value in a  $1 \times N$  result vector  $X$  and a row in an  $N \times 7$  matrix,  $M$ , to be multiplied with the  $1 \times 7$  parameter vector  $p$ :

$$X = M p$$

# Compute Transformation Parameters (Mixed Terms of $R$ and $T$ )

Two cases for using the parallelism constraint:

- Coplanar markers:  $Z_w = 0$

$$X_d = \begin{bmatrix} Y_d & X_w & Y_d & Y_w & Y_d & Z_w \\ r_1/T_y & r_2/T_y & r_3/T_y & T_x/T_y & r_4/T_y & r_5/T_y & r_6/T_y \end{bmatrix}_i^o$$

System of  $N$  linear equations with 5 parameters

- Non-coplanar markers

System of  $N$  linear equations with 7 parameters

The Tsai-code uses a routine (`lmdif_` from the MINPACK library) that minimizes the square error between predicted and actual marker locations in the image (based on the Levenberg-Marquardt algorithm)

# Determine R and T from Mixed Terms (Coplanar Case)

5 Parameters:  $r_1/T_y, r_2/T_y, T_x/T_y, r_4/T_y, r_5/T_y$

$$R: \begin{pmatrix} r_1 & r_2 & r_3 \\ r_4 & r_5 & r_6 \\ r_7 & r_8 & r_9 \end{pmatrix} \quad \text{submatrix } C : \begin{pmatrix} \overset{\circ}{r_1} & \overset{\circ}{r_2} & \cdot \\ \overset{\circ}{r_4} & \overset{\circ}{r_5} & \cdot \\ \cdot & \cdot & \cdot \end{pmatrix} = \begin{pmatrix} r_1/T_y & r_2/T_y & \cdot \\ r_4/T_y & r_5/T_y & \cdot \\ \cdot & \cdot & \cdot \end{pmatrix}$$

Observations:

- Unit row and column vectors,
- Mutually orthogonal column vectors

$$T_y^2 = \frac{S_r - \sqrt{S_r^2 - 4(\overset{\circ}{r_1} \overset{\circ}{r_5} - \overset{\circ}{r_4} \overset{\circ}{r_2})}}{2(\overset{\circ}{r_1} \overset{\circ}{r_5} - \overset{\circ}{r_4} \overset{\circ}{r_2})^2}, \quad \text{with: } S_r = \overset{\circ}{r_1}^2 + \overset{\circ}{r_2}^2 + \overset{\circ}{r_4}^2 + \overset{\circ}{r_5}^2$$

Determine sign of  $T_y$ : try out +/- 3D-to-2D projection for a non-central marker

# Determine R and T from Mixed Terms (Coplanar Case)

$$r_1 = r_1, T_y$$

$$r_2 = r_2, T_y$$

$$r_4 = r_4, T_y$$

$$r_5 = r_5, T_y$$

$$T_x = T_x, T_y$$

$$R = \begin{pmatrix} r_1 & r_2 & \sqrt{1 - r_1^2 - r_2^2} \\ r_4 & r_5 & s\sqrt{1 - r_4^2 - r_5^2} \\ r_7 & r_8 & r_9 \end{pmatrix}$$

$$(r_7 \ r_8 \ r_9) = (r_1 \ r_2 \ r_3) \times (r_4 \ r_5 \ r_6)$$

$$s = -\operatorname{sgn}(r_1 r_4 + r_2 r_5)$$

# Determine $R$ and $T$ from Mixed Terms (Non-Coplanar Case)

....

# Stage 2:

## Compute Focal Length, Distortion Coefficients, and z Position

- Compute an approximation of  $f$  and  $T_z$ , ignoring lens distortion  
for every marker  $i$ , compute


$$y_i f - T_z d_y Y_i = w_i d_y Y_i$$

with:

$$y_i = r_4 X_{wi} + r_5 Y_{wi} + r_6 Z_{wi} + T_y$$

$$w_i = r_7 X_{wi} + r_8 Y_{wi} + r_9 Z_{wi} = z_i - T_z$$

- Compute exact solution for  $f$ ,  $T_z$ ,  $\square_1$  and  $\square_2$



# Derivation of formula

for every marker i:

$$\frac{fy_i}{z_i} = d_y Y_i \quad (\text{3D-to-2d perspective projection} \\ + \text{camera sampling})$$

$$fy_i = z_i (d_y Y_i)$$

$$fy_i - T_z (d_y Y_i) = z_i (d_y Y_i) - T_z (d_y Y_i)$$

$$fy_i - T_z (d_y Y_i) = (z_i - T_z) (d_y Y_i)$$

$$fy_i - T_z d_y Y_i = w_i d_y Y_i$$

with:

$$y_i = r_4 X_{wi} + r_5 Y_{wi} + r_6 Z_{wi} + T_y$$

$$w_i = r_7 X_{wi} + r_8 Y_{wi} + r_9 Z_{wi} = z_i - T_z$$

$\alpha_x = 2 * \arctan(dx);$

$center_x = 0;$

$right = dx;$

$left = -dx;$

$near = 1.0;$

$dy = (h/2) / fy;$

$\alpha_y = 2 * \arctan(dy);$

$center_y = 0;$

$top = dy;$

$bottom = -dy;$

$far = 1e6;$

`glMatrixMode(GL_PROJECTION);`

`glFrustum(left, right, bottom, top, near, far);`

`glViewport(0,0,w,h);`

# Use of Results for OpenGL

Translation matrix:  
double TMat[16];

$$\begin{matrix} 1 & 0 & 0 & 0 \\ 0 & 1 & 0 & 0 \\ 0 & 0 & 1 & 0 \\ tx & -ty & -tz & 1 \end{matrix}$$

Rotation matrix:  
double RMat[16];

$$\begin{matrix} r1 & -r4 & -r7 & 0 \\ r2 & -r5 & -r8 & 0 \\ r3 & -r6 & -r9 & 0 \\ 0 & 0 & 0 & 1 \end{matrix}$$

(OpenGL matrices in column-major order!!! Rotated coordinate system)

glMultMatrixd (TMat);
glMultMatrixd (RMat);
("Fly-Through Mode")
```
